Schubert's string quartet D810 is called "Der Tod und das Mädchen" because the second movement contains a variation on Schubert's song, based on a poem by Matthias Claudius.

This arrangement is of the third movement: Scherzo (and Trio). The Scherzo itself is in D minor (like most of the whole composition) and it is very rhythmic and has lines that go down by half-tones, typical to express sorrow. The Trio is in D major and sounds much more cheerful. The sorrow returns in the Da Capo.

As is often the case this string quartet could not be simply copied into an accordion quartet, mainly because of the range of notes played by the cello. A bass part was added to give this arrangement more depth (the bass playing one octave lower than the cello) and to help out the fourth voice where the notes go too low for "small" accordions. (The bass cannot simply replace the cello in the original octave setting as the cello goes too high for a bass accordion.) The second violin part is also improved by taking advantage of the low F on 41-key accordions (whereas a violin only goes down to G).

In this arrangement the first voice is much more difficult than the other voices, because of fast runs and large jumps.
